
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Yellowstone Trail Celebration for Antique Auto Enthusiasts in Irvine Park

What Is The Yellowstone Trail?

Let's think of it as Route 66 only a few hundred miles north in the prime farm country of Northern Wisconsin. The trail was started in 1912 and it was a transcontinental road created by joining county roads into a long, connected chain that runs from Plymouth

MANY MAKES OF AUTOS IN THE CITY: Twenty-Seven Machines and Fourteen Different Names-List of Those Who Own Automobiles In City

Chippewa Falls has one automobile to every 370 persons residing within its limits. This is the computation arrived at by local automobile agents, making a total of 27 machines. From the present outlook the number of automobiles will be greatly augmented before the end of the year.

This is the record among the cities of the state, and probably of the Northwest. Chicago, a decidedly metropolitan city, has only one machine to every 456 persons, according to the assessor's report.

Perhaps no city in the state has as many makes of automobiles in proportion to its number. The following list may be of interest:

Rock to Puget Sound. Local groups from the different towns along the route got together to help create the road so they could "get out of the mud." Auto sales were growing and the owners soon found there were no connected routes on which to drive the new cars they had purchased. In 1912 a small band of men in South Dakota envisioned the road and named it to honor Yellowstone Park. It was built piece by piece with local county governments connecting their road to that of the adjoining county. This promoted cross-country tourist traffic. They marked the trail with signs and provided maps, thus raising interest for using the automobile for other than local travel.

Our group had taken the Trail over to Curtiss when it was dedicated in 2006. This was a fun time as Les Bowen was still alive at that time and he helped keep us entertained. My mother was born in Curtiss. Her father worked at a nearby cheese factory and her grand- parents operated the Hickock General Store. Mother's family later moved to Abbotsford. On the route to Owen we went by the cemetery where Grandpa and Grandma Peterson are buried. The Yellowstone Trail road to Owen is still a gravel road like we grew up on in the Town of Wheaton.

Our stop at Owen was impressive. One of the original trail markers was still on a building at the north end of town. There was an R on the building that designated the right turn that took us east towards Curtiss. We were then off to Withee where we stopped at one of my old customers from the Griffin Doege Auto Parts route that I used to run in this area. I also delivered a photo to a former customer of his father and then we were off to Thorp. There the Lieutenant Governor, Barbara Lawton, did a presentation on a new sign at a park on the east end of town. We stopped to see another customer of mine from yesteryear, Tom Smasal. It was good to have time to say howdy to old friends. Then we were off to Stanley where Dave Jankoski from the Stanley Historical Society welcomed the group and Bev Hompe dedicated another sign. We also had a chance to visit with another old customer, Jim Shoch, at Yellowstone Implement. He was happy to see us and took time to tell us about how their business had been named after the Yellowstone Trail.

Boyd was our next stop. Marcy Ruff and Ken Pilgrim had set up a display of local history in a tent along the old Yellowstone Trail. Marcy volunteers with us at the CCHS in the Genealogy Library. At the Park in Cadott the crew from their Historical Society entertained us. They also provided us with a hearty, delicious meal and after a few words invited us to visit them on any Monday at their quarters, across Highway 27 from their Park.

We then traveled back to Chippewa Falls where Jim Schumacher baffled us with his endless wit, and we dedicated a new sign in front of the Crane Lumber Company yards. Jim Schuh also had a few words about the Yellowstone Trail along with some of its history. We had around 20 old cars on this tour including a 1911 Wilton driven by Tom Wall, a 1937 Ford driven by Paul Oman, a 1940 Ford driven by Bob Buss, a 1941 Buick driven by Bob Baker and many others that I do not recall. My old Buddy Sherm Dull was riding with me and was getting pretty restless by this time so we headed on home. That's all for now from Engel's Little House on the Wheaton Prairie.

ANTIQUE AUTO ENTHUSIASTS Invited By The CHIPPEWA COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY To Chippewa Falls For The SOCIABILITY RUN





In the early 1900s there were no long distance highways, no road signs and no way to travel coast to coast by automobile. The roads were beaten paths created over the years by horse drawn wagon traffic. They often became impassable during the spring thaw and after heavy rains. In 1908 production of the Model-T Ford created the first affordable automobile and they soon became popular. In 1912 a group of concerned citizens formed the YELLOWSTONE TRAIL **ASSOCIATION:** a grass roots effort to create "A good road running coast to coast between Plymouth Rock and Puget Sound." Their slogan was "GET US OUT OF THE MUD." To promote their efforts Tin Lizzie owners were invited to travel together on country roads in a social motoring event. The first Yellowstone Trail "Sociability Run" was held during June 1912.

On June 2, 2012 the Chippewa County Historical Society is promoting a dawn to dusk Tin Lizzie Sociability Run along the Yellowstone Trail between Hudson and Marshfield. The Historical Society is hosting a "Mid-Day, Mid-Way Old-Fashioned Picnic" for event participants from Noon to 2pm at Irvine Park in Chippewa Falls. Antique Auto Club members from western and central Wisconsin are being invited to attend the picnic to celebrate the 100 year anniversary of the trail's beginning.





COUNTY NEWS

Cadott Area Historical Society

DOROTHY KAISER, PRESIDENT

This year 2012 marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Cadott Area Historical Society. Many activities were planned around this milestone. In May we held Heritage Days for the fourth, fifth and sixth grade students in the Cadott Schools. A blacksmith shop was built in our agricultural building where students learned about this bygone trade. At the historical Bohemian Hall a music and movie show, held in April, featured past local citizens. Our local newspaper "The Cadott Sentinel" had a booth at Nabor Days where we sold maple syrup sundaes and had a raffle. Our activities closed in August with a Fall Harvest dinner and a pie and basket auction.

This year we acquired a 130 year old country school, the Baker School. Originally this school house was across the highway but now resides on our property. We feel students will see many differences between the one room school and their classrooms of today.

Improvements and changes have been made in the Business/Domestic Building. Members have constructed a layers office, general store and a trading post. by all measures, we have had another

good year. a few new exhibits were developed and several underwent changes. There are many projects waiting to be done and I'm sure the volunteers will meet the challenge.



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arch 2012 saw a major change to the History Center that will make our mission to save the rich history of our area much easier. Have you ever been to the fourth floor of the History Center? If you had, you would have found a hallway with half the ceiling tile on the floor, a number of holes in the ceilings from past roof leaks and bats. This was complemented by storage of mostly unwanted items including bats. Today you can safely

venture to the fourth floor to our new artifact storage work area.

How did this miracle occur? Well if you take Jim Schuh, Skip August, Joe Bowe, Steve Rasmus, Jeff Pritchard and myself give them a budget and a task to make the fourth floor usable plus the key ingredient of free labor complements of the Chippewa Valley Correctional Training Facility (CVCTF)—you have what it takes. This project began when Jim Schuh contacted CVCTF in February to see if we could get a crew to help with the transformation of the fourth floor. Megan the supervisor of the Early Release Program (ERP) at CVCTF came to look over the site on February 14. She arranged for a crew of eight to be at the History Center on March 12 for a week and a second crew of eight to work the week of March 19.

Needless to say this quick response resulted in lots of activity to be ready by then. An electrition completed wiring and new service. Next came a trip for Jim and me to Menards to order insulation, drywall, paint and other material. On March 12 "The Pathfinders" arrived at the History Center. Each group of men in ERP names their group. "The Pathfinders" were eight men ready to do what ever was needed to change the fourth floor. Supervised by volunteer Joe Bowe—the old ceiling was removed, insulation put up, drywall hung taped and mudded, holes patched, wall painted and shelves built. The work accomplished that week was amazing.

On March 19 "The Unknowns" arrived and began another week of work. Construction on the fourth floor was quickly finished and then came the task of moving artifacts from all of the nooks and crannies in the building to their new home on the fourth floor. In addition to that the schoolroom exhibit was taken down and stored which allowed the Lumber exhibit to be moved from the second floor to the third floor. This move allows the lumbering exhibit to be larger and incorporate the sawmill model in the exhibit. The vacated lumberroom on the second floor became a music room displaying the many musical instruments in our collection. Moving artifacts to the fourth floor opened up a room for exhibits on the third floor. This now displays the history of household devices and appliances. Also the photographic display was relocated to the lower level.

The amount of work and the willingness of the groups from CVCTF was fantastic. The relationship developed these two weeks by the CCHS volunteers and the men resulted in an invitation to the graduation of both groups from the ERP. Some of the CCHS volunteers attended the graduations. Each graduate spoke about what they had learned during the six month ERP and each of them thanked us for having them at the History Center to help us. Needless to say it was a rewarding experience for all. Joe Bowe, the project manager that kept everyone busy which resulted in the amazing accomplishment, was given a lifetime membership in the Society for all his help by The Board of Directors.

There is still a lot of work to do! We are looking to develop an ongoing relationship with CVCTF to get additional help on other projects. Visit us soon. Dave :
